Breaking News About Your Board!

Michael Toivonen has agreed to switch from being a MWWG board member at large to being the MWWG board president following an election of board members to be held at the October meeting. The following words are his:

First, our thanks to Kurt Mottweiler for continuing on as president after expressing his desire to retire last fall. And the same thanks to Stan Hall for continuing as vice president and insuring that we had another successful show. I have agreed to take on Kurt's role.

I would also like to thank Neal Otto for taking over as editor of the Guild's Newsletter following the departure from Corvallis of Gary Radice.

Let's talk about the vice presidency. At its August meeting the Guild's board decided to make a major change: the vice president of the board will no longer be in charge of the Guild's big event, our annual spring show. This job will now be handled by the newly created position of Spring Show Coordinator. Assuming a similar level of volunteers to assist with the show as we had this last spring the Show Coordinator will have plenty of help.

I should note that we have a volunteer to coordinate show in the Footwise store window.

After subtracting running the show being the vice president will be limited to attending several in person board meetings a year, keeping up with and responding to board emails as needed and standing in to run our monthly meetings when the president is unavailable.

The hope is that by turning one job into two the Guild gets some volunteers to fill these two open positions. Stan has reserved the space in the library for next spring's show.

But without a show coordinator this is the bottom line: we will not have a show. Note: Stan Hall has agreed to advise the new show coordinator on what needs to be done.

And the Guild needs a new vice president. Following the subtraction of the need to run the show being VP is just one step above being a member at large, with the principle difference being available to, rarely, run our regular meetings.

Speaking of board members at large, the board is always willing to add them. Based on my personal experience, being a member at large is a good way to have a bigger say in directing the Guild's activities with a minor time commitment. After a couple of years as a member at large I had a better sense of the Guild, and wanting help it keep afloat, I have agreed to become president.

We need to fill the vice president's position asap and the Show Coordinator needs to be in place by early January. I know we have multiple members very capable of taking on these roles, including, most likely, you.

If you want to volunteer for either position but cannot attend the next meeting, please let me know. And if you want to continue the tradition of the VP handling the show, no worries, go for it!

Guild Meeting Recap: An Evening with Nick Clark

At our latest guild gathering, Nick Clark delivered an informative and entertaining presentation that covered a broad spectrum of woodworking knowledge.

Topics included laminations, veneer work, strategies for reducing spring back, and choosing the right glues for lamination.

Design was a central theme throughout the evening, with inspiration drawn from Krenov's philosophy of craftsmanship. This



sparked a lively comparison of live versus loose tenons, underscoring how joinery decisions influence both structure and style.

Adding a personal touch, Nick shared shop stories that brought the craft to life. He described building a massive 20-foot table, two inches thick, that required six people just

to move. The evening closed on a lighter note with the tale of producing a continuous 20-foot planer shaving on that same table—an impressive feat that drew both admiration and plenty of laughter.

Thank you Nick for the great presentation and to Wade Hardware for providing such an outstanding space.

Dear Disgusted,

Thank you for your letter and for exposing this pressing issue. Our investigation confirmed your claims: sawdust was indeed found on shop floors, sometimes mere minutes after sweeping.

Woodworkers defended the practice, insisting sawdust cushions dropped chisels, hides coffee spills, and marks territory like pine-scented snow.

We agree that cleanliness has its place but remember: a spotless shop may mean either the tools are sold, or the woodworker's taken up golf.
